



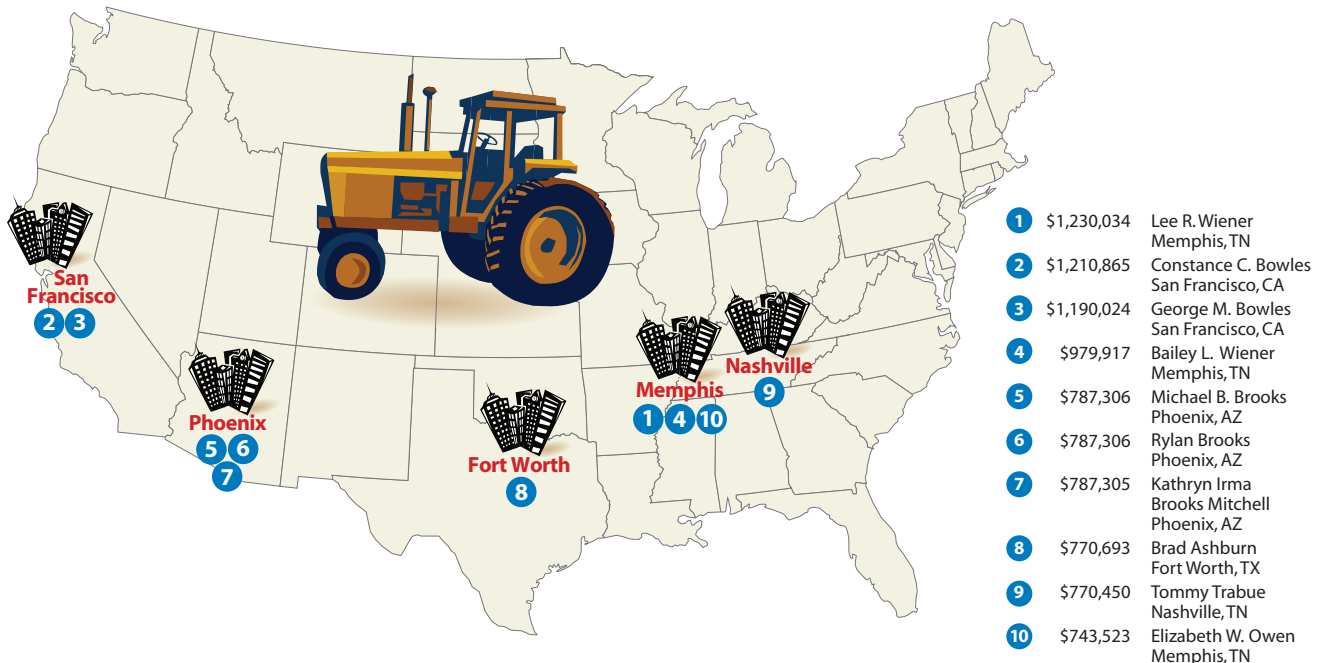

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TOP 10 URBAN 'FARMERS'

It's no surprise that farmers who reap the biggest federal crop subsidies live in rural areas. It's a bit of a shocker, though, that plenty of city slickers — some related to each other — are among the 350,000 folks who culled bushels of cash out of the \$25 billion in annual subsidies. The "Top 10" subsidy recipients who live in big cities raked in from \$743,500 to \$1.2 million in 2003-2005.
