# **Executive Summary**



#### Health Care Quality Compared to 4 Years Ago

O Voters are somewhat more likely to say they do not think health care costs and benefits are better than four years ago, with 53% saying their own health care has not improved and even more, 58%, saying the country's are not better.

#### Opinions Around King v. Burwell

- Obamacare is following the law (55%), while 46% think it should have stayed out of it.
- o If the Supreme Court strikes down the subsidies, more than 6 in 10 (61%) think Congress should remove mandates and regulations as a response, rather than passing legislation to legalize the subsidies (39%).

#### **Messaging Tips**

Focus on benefits for all – Mandates win out over subsidies when couched in these terms.

Communicate sensitivity to those affected.

- o If the subsidies are struck down, the majority of voters would blame either the Democratic-controlled Congress that passed the legislation or President Obama (58%).
  - About one-third of voters (36%) will blame the Republicans who control the House.

#### Message Testing


- O About 7 in 10 agreed with messages against restoring subsidies. About 6 in 10 agreed with messages about the negative view a Supreme Court ruling against subsidies would give them of Obamacare.
- A majority of voters agreed with statements about potential for backfire if Republicans continue the subsidies, with most (77%) agreeing that it sends the message that they are needed for Americans to afford health care and 67% saying they will bear the blame when the subsidies are later taken away.



# More Think Their Health Care Is Not Better Than 4 Years Ago




Thinking about the health care coverage you now have—how much it costs and the benefits it provides you—would you say **your health care coverage** is better than it was four years ago?

# Even More Think America's Health Care Is Not Better Than 4 Years Ago




Now, thinking about health care in our country as a whole—how much it costs people and the benefits and coverage it provides—would you say **health** care coverage in our country is better than it was four years ago?






#### **Strong Agreement With Messages on Response to Decision**




#### Most Agree with Concerns Of Republicans Extending Subsidies





# Continuing Subsidies vs. Two-Pronged Approach

# **About 6 in 10 Think Congress Should Address Mandates** in Addition to Subsidies

**41%** think Congress may never agree on how to fix Obamacare. So rather than focusing on fixing it, the most important thing to do right now is pass legislation that continues to pay the subsidies until everything else gets worked out.



**59%** think we need to pass new legislation that does two things: eliminates the mandates and regulations that have driven up the costs, and continues to pay the subsidies for a few years until the cost savings kick in.



# Voters Evenly Split On Messages Around Eliminating Mandates vs. Extending Subsidies

50% think a big part of the problem with Obamacare is that we keep applying band aids to a plan that just doesn't work. Rather than applying another band aid and continuing subsidies for who knows how long, we should instead take the Supreme Court's decision as a signal to get at the core problem once and for all and eliminate the mandates and regulations that are driving costs up.



50% that Obamacare may have some flaws that need fixing, but the first priority is to pass legislation to continue the subsidies so we do not leave anyone stranded with no way to pay for their coverage. Not providing continuation of the Obamacare subsidies is insensitive and uncaring.


