

Obamacare Messaging: King v. Burwell & Reconciliation

Executive Summary

A recent survey of 1,014 U.S. voters conducted under the American Perceptions Initiative shows that support for Obamacare is mixed, with slightly more opposing it and supporting repeal. Messages aimed at repealing Obamacare received somewhat more support than those against, with those advocating for removing mandates and decreasing costs showing the greatest success.

Support for Obamacare

- O Support for Obamacare is mixed, with slightly more opposing it (50%) than supporting it (45%). 51% opted for repeal and 49% said Congress should keep it and give it time and support to work.
- O However, a slight gap opens up when considering people's attitudes about how the law is working. Just over half (54%) identified with a statement that the problems with the rollout were just the beginning. Fewer (46%) identified instead with the statement that the law was badly needed and is working.

Message Testing

- Messages aimed at repeal fared slightly better than those aimed at keeping the law, with about 2 in 3 supporting repeal messages.
 - The strongest support in the study was garnered by messages about removing mandates to decrease cost, with about 7 in 10 agreeing with each. In fact, almost half of those who support Obamacare agreed.
- A statement made by Hillary Clinton showed a 3% decrease in support when it was attributed to her, due largely to the very negative effect it had on those who say they oppose Obamacare (+12% much more likely to support repeal as a result).

Reconciliation

- Just over half agreed that Congress should repeal Obamacare this summer, with the strongest support for "using the same process that was used to pass" (61%) and slightly less for using reconciliation specifically (58%) or the broader alternative -"every option possible" (55%).
 - Notably, 1 in 4 of those who support Obamacare agreed that Congress should use reconciliation to repeal and follow through on their promise.

Messaging Tips

Include a personal appeal – reference "Americans", "individuals", or "you".


Orient messages around cost.

Highlight the law's flaws and its impact on each individual American and tie those to proposed changes to the law.

Tie repeal to themes above to boost support.




Strong Support For Removing Mandates to Decrease Cost

Most Americans now recognize that the Affordable Care Act imposed new regulations that made health insurance more expensive.


Pursuing full repeal of Obamacare is a civic duty for members of the House and Senate that ran on the promise to overturn the unpopular health care law.

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

Scenario: SCOTUS Rules Subsidies Not Legal




