



Who is up for grabs in 2024?



Key Groups: Opportunities and Challenges

Suburban Women

For middle class families, today's economy is a treadmill where no matter how hard you run, you can't get ahead. This sense of disquiet is strongest among women, who are on the frontlines trying to protect the family budget from being eaten away by rising costs. And that pain is acutely felt in everything from the grocery bill to rising health insurance premiums.

They are concerned not only for their financial but physical security, with many saying they can no longer go out at night or have to carry weapons when leaving the house. Abortion may be a stumbling block for these voters, though.

Suburban Men

For men, the choice in 2024 hinges on a pragmatic decision of who was better for the economy—Trump or Biden. A penchant for bold action to take on problems is pushing many towards Trump, but they also gravitate towards economic populism which could be taken up by either side.



Key Groups: Opportunities and Challenges

Older & College-Educated Voters

Some traditionally conservative audiences voters amongst seniors and the college-educated have drifted away in recent years due to personalities.

But there remains a strong appetite amongst these voters for a conservative message. When asked about a conservative agenda of controlling inflation, securing the border, and reducing crime, voters over 65 and whites with a college degree support the agenda far more than the candidate. Constantly impressing upon these voters the policy stakes could have a significant impact.

Parents

Parents feel besieged from all sides. Raising kids, the cost of living has hit home particularly hard. And what's happening in schools isn't helping. Focus group respondents reported pulling their kids out of school post-Covid because of policies not aligned with their values. Parents are more likely to think that there's a problem with age-inappropriate discussions of sexuality in schools and that these issues should be left to parents. The impact of social media on kids is a #1 concern.



Key Groups: Opportunities and Challenges

Black Men

Black men are taking control of their economic future and physical safety. They think the economy was better 4 years ago than it is now, and particularly in our focus group in Atlanta, entrepreneurship and Trump's business background resonated. They own guns to protect their families and express strong interest in school choice to keep their kids physically and emotionally safe. Black voters as a whole are extremely concerned about mass illegal immigration threatening the country's ability to take care of its own people first.

Latino Voters

Latinos are optimistic about the American Dream for themselves because they've lived it, but are deeply concerned about whether it will be the same for their kids.

They look at the border with the same dismay as all voters do, sensing that those who cross the border are very different than their families who have come into the country. And they place a strong premium on those work hard and play by the rules, rejecting policies that would give







Keeping the main thing the main thing:

The cost of living is the defining issue of 2024 for swing voters.

And they talk about the issue in terms of groceries and gas, but also healthcare and housing...

Ties between the economic future for young people and the fact that being homeowners was more attainable.

Healthcare costs worry voters on both sides of the political spectrum.

"...we bought our house when we first moved out here ... but we grew our family, so now we have three daughters versus one. So we thought about moving, upgrading to a bigger house and it's like for \$500, \$600,000 less than 2,000 square feet to get a house. And it's just crazy to think that, right? So we just put that on hold and it doesn't look like it's going to change...". - Phoenix man

"...people can't afford to go to the doctor even if they wanted to because you either have to pay 20% co-insurance or an \$800 deductible. And I don't know about most people, but most people I don't think have \$800 laying around." - Pittsburgh woman




Below the Surface: Not Taking Care of Our Own



"In Chicago... they opened up an entire shelter for all these illegals, but they had hundreds of homeless people that they didn't shelter. But the illegals that you brought there, they can have a warm place or a cool place to stay. That bothers me. These are Americans. Why are we not taking care of our own people... We have to be good before we can take in other people and take care of them." -Atlanta Woman

Below the Surface: Healthcare Costs




- Ranked #2 out of the 14 messages we tested when it comes to agreement
- This message particularly resonates with Dads with 71% in agreement, Moms with 64% in agreement and 78% of Hispanic men over 50.

"Everything is so much more expensive... My health insurance is through the roof. I can't even use it because I can't afford to meet the deductible before it actually kicks in and pays for 80%...things are just getting worse and worse." -Pittsburgh Woman

- 44% of voters ages 18-34 worry about housing costs a great deal.
- 45% of Black voters and 46% of Hispanic voters worry about housing a great deal, in contrast to only 27% of white voters who said the same.



Swing Voters: Key points to emphasize


- It's not just that swing voters think the Biden Administration has failed—it's that they prefer the Trump Administration's policies. Continuing drive home the Administration's failures—on the cost of living, the border, and foreign policy—remains incredibly important to all groups.
- But this overarching message needs some tweaks among the voters most up for grabs in 2024...
 - Talking about the border in terms of strained social services here at home. Crime and drugs are the primary border concerns for voters overall, but belief that migrants are straining social services for Americans over indexes among swing voters and previously solid progressive constituencies like young voters and Black voters. And a message about taking care of our own before solving problems abroad is the #1 message tested—with stronger support from these same groups.
 - **Healthcare costs = inflation.** Swing voters view spiraling health care costs as an extension of the rising cost of living. They think the Biden Administration has failed—but ultimately don't think either side has credibility on the issue. First, we need to position ourselves on the side of these voters. **A strong critique of the Biden Administration's failure to contain** healthcare costs will make an economic indictment of the Administration more convincing.
 - Housing costs mean the American Dream is slipping away. Swing voters, younger voters, and minority voting blocs worry more about not being able to afford a home for themselves—and older voters worry about future prospects for the next generation. Even if headline inflation numbers recede, interest rates remain high and housing will remain a significant concern.


Trump retrospective job approval tops Biden approval across all geographies






Q. Do you approve or disapprove of the way Joe Biden is handling his job as President? Q. Do you approve or disapprove of the way Donald Trump handled his job as President?

Few swing voters prefer the Biden Administration's approach across a range of issues






Trump leads in 5 of 6 swing states, Biden up 1 in WI





GOP leads generic ballot, but more are open to persuasion








Q. If the election for Congress were held today and you had to make a choice, for whom would you vote, the Republican candidate or the Democratic candidate?

Swing voters blame Biden policies for the border and inflation, less so for increasing violent crime






Q. Do you think blame for each of the following problems can be mostly attributed to the policies of the Biden Administration, or do you think they are mostly due to factors outside their control?






Conservative agenda performs best in Michigan, and outperforms most in the Rust Belt





Conservative agenda outperforms Trump among older, white college, and black voters, while Trump outperforms among younger voters






























Social Unease














Q. When it comes to issues of gender identity and sexuality in [Split Sample A: K-12 public schools / Split Sample B: public high schools], which side do you agree with most?






Q. When it comes to issues of gender identity and sexuality in K-12 public schools, which side do you agree with the most?




Compared to their male counterparts, women feel abortion is further than where they think it ought to be after Roe v. Wade was overturned

Messaging and movement

Methodology

For the ensuing messaging battery, surveyed participants were randomly divided and **presented with a split sample** survey methodology. On many topics, this entailed participants being **shown one version** of the messaging to express their opinion on. Within each group, participants were shown the messaging in a randomized sequence.



Messaging Key

Biden Caused Inflation	The cost of living skyrocketed and the price of basic essentials went up by 20% because of the Biden Administration's reckless spending policies, spending trillions [ver. B and ballooning the national debt to \$34 trillion].
Border Crisis	The Biden Administration caused the crisis on the southern border by ending the policy that kept all asylum-seekers on the other side. As a result, almost 8 million people flooded into the country, [ver.A allowing criminals and drugs into our communities] [ver. B straining public services for our citizens].
Rising Crime	Since the Biden Administration took office, crime has only gotten worse, making our communities less safe. Big city mayors and prosecutors district attorneys care more about looking progressive than having the backs of our police officers. As a result, police are making fewer arrests and criminals know they won't get caught or prosecuted.
World on Fire	Four years ago, the United States was brokering peace treaties, the world was at peace and for the first time in a long time, the U.S. was not involved in a major war. Now, the world is on fire with major wars in Ukraine and the Middle East, and weak leadership in the White House has made it worse, [ver. B starting with the Biden Administration's rushed and haphazard withdrawal from Afghanistan].

Messaging Key, Cont'd

High Gas Prices

[Ver A: Under the influence of radical environmentalists,] the Biden Administration has done everything possible to hobble our domestic energy industry, canceling drilling projects that would have brought gas prices down.

EV Mandates

In a time when Americans are struggling to afford the basic essentials, the Biden Administration wants to force people to buy electric vehicles that most people can't afford and that don't work as well as gas-powered cars.

Student Loan Bailout

The Biden Administration forgiving student loans is unfair to the tens of millions of people who were responsible and paid off their loans, [VER B: and to those who never went to college, who earn less money to begin with].

Obamacare Not Working

Under Obamacare, health insurance premiums have continued to skyrocket and the Biden Administration is just doubling down on it. It's time for a new direction to bring health care costs down.




"Fix Problems at home" message resonates not only well overall, but with key groups such as with swing voters and younger voters.


While messaging on Obamacare resonates well with swing voters, and white and hispanic voters, it falls flat for black voters.


Messaging about the border crisis, with emphasis on crime leaking into the US, does well across the board, not just near border


Simpler student loan message works better, with college women reacting negatively to wording about non-graduates

Methodology

- Echelon Insights conducted a survey on behalf of the Heritage Foundation, fielded from March 12-19, 2024 in English among a sample of N=2,401 Likely Voters in Swing States (N= 401 in Arizona, N=400 in Georgia, N=400 in Michigan, N=400 in Nevada, N=400 in Pennsylvania, and N=400 in Wisconsin) sampled from the voter file in these states. 50% of responses were collected via text-to-web, 26% from landline live caller with professional interviewers, 24% from cellphones live caller with professional interviewers.
- The sample was weighted to population benchmarks for registered voters and the 2024 Likely Electorate on on gender, age, race/ethnicity, education, region, party, past primary participation, and 2020 presidential vote, adjusted for 2024 turnout probability. All benchmarks for the 2024 Likely Electorate were adjusted for turnout estimates based on a probabilistic model of the likely 2024 electorate derived from the L2 voter file.
- Estimates for gender, age, and party were derived from the L2 voter file. Estimates for race/ethnicity and education were derived from the US Census Bureau's American Community Survey demographic data adjusted to match voter registration estimates from the November 2020 Current Population Survey Voting and Registration Supplement.
- Calculated the way it would be for a random sample and adjusted to incorporate the effect of weighting, the margin of sampling error is +/- 2.3 percentage points overall, +/-5.7 in Arizona, +/-5.7 in Georgia, +/-5.3 in Michigan, +/-5.8 in Nevada, +/-5.5 in Pennsylvania, and +/-5.5 in Wisconsin.
